The Brewsters of Birch Rock

After six years of teaching and coaching at the Country Day School in Newton, MA with summers working at Camp Chewonki on the coast of Maine, William "Chief" Brewster and his wife Onie decided in the summer of 1925 to start a boys' camp in the foothills of Oxford County. Their objective was to locate their camp on the eastern shore of a clean, fresh-water lake so that their campers could appreciate healthy aquatic activities, physical fitness and the natural beauty of Maine sunsets. Moreover, the Brewsters were determined to create a

community built on tradition and human values as they articulated in their original camp diary:

"A boy cannot grow solely on food, sleep and safe living and playing conditions. He also needs the challenge of something new to learn and explore, the close contact with nature, and many kinds of challenges to meet and master other than those he can find in his home or his school."

With the help of the Morton Family of Paris Manufacturing Company and the camp's faithful neighbors Burton Sanderson and his sister Helen of Camp McWain for girls, the Brewsters and their partner, Bartlett Boyden, found just the location they were looking for in Burton Sanderson's western pasture and maple grove on the side of McWain Hill. Near the shore land, they found a graceful white birch tree growing on top of a boulder, from which the camp took its name. Birch Rock started its first season on July 1, 1926 with 13 campers and the main lodge, five cabins and a washhouse. Camp enrollment doubled to 26 in 1927 and tripled to 39 in 1928. Chief and Onie Brewster remained active in running the camp until their deaths in 1972 and 1982, respectively.


As summer camps move in generations of time, so, too, did Birch Rock. From their birth Chief and Onie's sons, William "Bill" Jr. and Seward "Pat" Brewster grew up at camp and later became campers. As teenagers, the boys attended Kimball Union Academy in Meriden, NH, where their father was Headmaster for twenty-two years. Bill and Pat spent many a summer at Birch Rock working along with their parents teaching swimming, canoeing and other aquatic and field activities. Both boys graduated from Dartmouth College in Hanover, NH and embarked on distinguished careers. Bill went on to medical school and he established his practice as well as securing a new home with his wife in Seattle, WA. Pat continued working at

camp as the Waterfront Director and Head Counselor during law school and brought his beloved wife Carol back with him to camp

in 1955. Chief and Onie built a cabin for them to live by McWain Pond on the Camp premises. Carol, a graduate of Middlebury College in Vermont had a long history of working in camps.

Coming from the West Coast, Bill's children, Scott and Wenda, were introduced to their family camp in the mid 1950s. Birch Rock had its first female camper in Wenda. Although living at a great distance from Waterford, Maine, Bill's daughter Wenda has maintained a fond association with the Camp. When Pat's law career began to takeoff, his summers at Birch Rock ended for him and Carol. His devotion to the Camp and its mission were embraced, however, by his three boys: Ben, Seth and Toby who came to Birch Rock in the late 1960's as campers.

After Chief passed away during the camp season of 1973, his devoted wife and partner Onie outreached to the camp community for a renewed sense of preservation for Birch Rock. Under the

guidance of George Brett, Frank Carney and her youngest son Pat, the camp began to formulate a board of advisors that later would become trustees of the BRC Community. Onie called upon her devoted veteran staff: Mike and Phyllis Deneault and David Weeks to lead the camp. Mike and Phyllis were working at Milton Academy at the time, and David was working at the Kingsley School in Boston. For the next six summers, the Deneaults directed the camp as Dave assumed the Head Counselor role. In 1980, with the endorsement of the Brewster Family. Dave succeeded the retiring Deneaults and invited the Brewster brothers to be on his staff.

From 1979 through 1992, Ben, Seth

and Toby returned to Birch Rock as counselors, leaders and directors. In the summer of 1982 Ben co-directed Birch Rock with Dave and his grandmother Onie passed away in December of that year. With his youngest brother Toby as his Head Counselor and partner, Ben directed Birch Rock for two successful summers while also working at the Waynflete School in Portland, ME. Ben's untimely death was a shock to both the Brewster family and the BRC community. With the support of Birch Rock Board President Whizzer Wheeler and Pat Brewster, Toby Brewster assumed the directorship of Birch Rock in 1985. Working with his brother Seth


> and a fiercely loyal staff, Toby moved the camp forward and began to rebuild the future of Birch Rock seeking the support of many alumni and loyal Birch Rock families. Doug Dickey joined Toby as Co-director and later Toby's beautiful and dedicated bride Becca Glimp, helped the camp strengthen its leadership.

> Toby and Becca along with the support of his brother Seth and his wife Helene Kazanjian rebuilt the camp's recruiting organization and community communication. The soul of Birch Rock was reinvigorated as the third generation of Brewsters provided a road map and strategic plan to preserve the leadership and future preservation of the Camp community. Birch Rock continued to operate with the support of the Brewster family's second and third generation guidance. In 1994 the Brewster family formally pledged to ensure the future of Birch Rock

by establishing a 501c3 nonprofit corporation from which the camp could continue to operate under the auspices of a formal board of trustees.


The camp corporation operates today under a 100 year lease from

the Brewster family. Thanks to the strong will and spirited dedication of the Brewsters, The Campaign for Birch Rock.



Today, the Birch Rock Community operates under the leadership of Rich Deering and

Mike Mattson but continues to have the unyielding support of the Brewster Family. Since the passing of her husband, Pat, Carol has remained an active member of the board of trustees and a loving grandparent to a fourth generation of Birch Rockers. Carol Brewster has enjoyed Seth and Helene's three children: Benjamin, Hannah and Victoria and Toby and Becca's four boys: William, continued on page 4

New Infirmary To Be Built & Named Brewster Lodge



At the annual summer board meeting, the BRC Board of Trustees have approved a building plan as a tribute to the Brewster legacy while enhancing the quality of health care and services for the camp community. Treasurer Michael Herzig stated: In naming the new infirmary the 'Brewster Lodge,' the Birch Rock community recognizes the boundless dedication of three generations of Brewsters to Birch Rock. This new building will retain the spirit and function of the original 'infirmary,' which will also was the summer home to Onie in the years following Chief Brewster's death in 1973.

From the original concept created by Chief and Onie, all the way through to the current stewardship of service of Seth and Toby, there has always been a Brewster in a leadership position at Birch Rock, ensuring that the founding principles of 'character and community' are as evident today as they were in 1926. It is also important to remember that Birch Rock stands alongside other great New England institutions such as Kimball Union Academy, Country Day School, Deerfield Academy, and now St. Paul's Academy, where the Brewsters have made tremendous contributions to the great legacy of education in New England. The Brewster Lodge represents an assurance that there will always be a reminder of the family's dedication to Birch Rock for the generations to come."

February 25, 1917 - July 23, 2007

The Birch Rock Community expresses its heart-felt sadness in the passing of our great former leader and fellow Birch Rocker, Harold J. "Mike" Deneault. Mike died at home on Monday, July 23, 2007 with his children: Ann, Jason and Michael by his side.

Born in Burlington, VT, February 25, 1917, he was a graduate of Burlington High School. He received his Associates Degree from Kimball Union Academy in Meriden, NH.

A WWII veteran of the US Army, he served from 1944 until 1946 in the European Theatre with the 117th General Hospital.

Mike was an Athletic Trainer and Coach at Kimball Union Academy and Milton Academy for many years retiring in 1982. He and his beloved wife Phyllis became devoted to Birch Rock Camp after having worked there for many summers. The protégé of BRC trip leader legend, Buc Hard, Mike led canoe trips in Maine and New Hampshire. He and his wife Phyllis also worked closely with Camp founders William "Chief" and Onie Brewster. After "Chief" Brewster's passing, Onie Brewster invited Mike and his wife, Phyllis, to be the Directors of Birch Rock Camp.

Mike and Phyllis Holden were married April 17, 1944 at Fort Devens, MA. They celebrated 57 years of marriage before her passing on March 29, 2002.

One of Mike's parting wishes to his children was to have the engraving of Birch Rock's motto, "Help the Other Fellow" on his tomb stone. Even when he was struggling with his own pain, Mike thought about the welfare of others. He also was a great role model for leadership. The plaque on the outer wall of Deneault's Den, which was dedicated to Mike and Phyllis in July 2006 reads as "Lead by Example.' Mike Deneault was a true gentleman whose signature wave, great smile and sense of humor will fondly be remembered.

A Celebration of Mike's Life was held at his home in Lanesboro, MA and attended by Fellow Birch Rock Directors David Weeks and Toby Brewster on August 12, 2007. The Birch Rock Family has set up a memorial scholarship in recognition of Mike and Phyllis Deneault to be awarded annually.

Eli, Peter and Seth. Both of Carol's sons Seth and Toby have joined her in actively participating on the Board of Trustees and perpetuating the leadership of the Brewster family.

Birch Rock, like other summer camps, is a unique community, whose fundamental purpose is to bring children together in a safe, nurturing environment and to provide an opportunity for children to learn without the pressures and distractions that are ever present during the academic year. A free and spirited oasis of lifelong learning, Birch Rock promotes cooperation, builds self-confidence and encourages a willingness to try new things. Campers are challenged to take responsibility for their own lives and are encouraged to appreciate the needs of others in practicing the camp motto: HELP THE OTHER FELLOW.

One of the best residential boys' camps in Maine, Birch Rock has established a high standard for its camp program and facility. This standard is firmly grounded in the traditions established by founders Chief and Onie Brewster and perpetuated by the leadership of their children and grandchildren. Just as the graceful white birch upon the rock remains strong against the forces of nature, so will the legacy of the Brewster family keep the fire of Birch Rock burning for many years to come.


